<p>If adopted, the amendment would:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Require sentence reductions of incarcerated individuals, except individuals incarcerated for murder, rape, or child molestation, by up to 25% if the individual participates in rehabilitative, work, or educational programming.</li> <li>• Mandate that criminal offenses of obtaining, possessing, or using any drug such as fentanyl, heroin, methamphetamine, cocaine, LSD, and other controlled substances cannot be classified as a felony, but only a misdemeanor.</li> <li>• Prohibit jail time as a sentence for obtaining, possessing, or using such drugs until an individual's third offense within 24 months.</li> <li>• Allow an individual convicted of obtaining, possessing, or using any such drug prior to the effective date of the amendment to ask a court to reduce the conviction to a misdemeanor, regardless of whether the individual has completed the sentence.</li> <li>• Require any available funding, based on projected savings, to be applied to state-administered rehabilitation programs and crime victim funds.</li> </ul>	<p><b>Issue 8</b></p> <p><b>Proposed Tax Levy (Renewal and Increase)</b> <b>Summit County Children Services Board</b></p> <p>A majority affirmative vote is necessary for passage.</p>	<p>A renewal of 2.25 mills and an increase of 1 mill to constitute a tax for the benefit of Summit County to <b>support children services and the care and placement of children by the Summit County Children Services Board</b> at a rate not exceeding 3.25 mills for each one dollar of valuation, which amounts to 32.5 cents for each one hundred dollars of valuation, for 6 years, commencing in 2019, first due in calendar year 2020.</p> <p><input type="radio"/> FOR THE TAX LEVY</p> <p><input type="radio"/> AGAINST THE TAX LEVY</p>
